Comfort Birds

Frank Foust began carving Comfort Birds in 1982 and has given them away to people around the world in need of comfort - the ill, blind, homeless, elderly, and those in disaster areas. You can read the article about him in Woodcarving Illustrated, Holiday 2011, Issue 57. You can also read it online by searching for "How to Carve a Comfort Bird." In this article, Mr. Foust uses a rotary-power carver with a small diamond bit to carve his birds, however, we'll be carving ours with carving knives and/or other hand tools.

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Draw a line on top of the bird, centered, from beak to tail.
- 2. Using a V-tool, make a curved cut along the sides and back of the head, delineating the neck.
- 3. Use your V-tool below the forehead to divide it from the beak.
- 4. Begin removing the edges and rounding the cut-out.
- 5. Continue rounding and shaping both the body and head of your bird until you like its appearance.
- 6. Sand your bird with rough sandpaper and finish sanding with a fine sandpaper. Be sure to get in the small space around the neck area.
- 7. Finish your bird with any of the following: boiled linseed oil, clear polyurethane, Danish oil, or anything else you prefer.
